Hard track

This walk follows a large section of Lane Cove River. The walk follows the Riverside Walking track up the Lane Cove River to De Burghs Bridge. From the bridge the track winds back along the hillside on the other side of the river. The track then passes a few historic buildings, and the Visitor Centre, before crossing at the weir and returning to the Tourist Park. There are plenty of grassy picnic areas along the way and the Boat Shed sells snacks. Let us begin by acknowledging the Darug people, Traditional Custodians of the land on which we travel today, and pay our respects to their Elders past and present.

Getting to the start: From Warringah Freeway, M1

- Turn on to Lane Cove Tunnel, M2 then drive for 5.1 km
- Keep left onto Epping Road Offramp, M2 and drive for another 870 m
- Turn right onto Delhi Road, A38 and drive for another 630 m
- Turn left onto Plassey Road and drive for another 720 m
- Turn right and drive for another 30 m


## Before you start any journey ensure you;

- Tell someone you trust where you are going and what to do if you are late returning
- Have adequate equipment, supplies, skills \& knowledge to undertake this journey safely
- Consider weather forecasts, park/track closures \& fire dangers
- Can respond to emergencies \& call for help at any point
- Are healthy and fit enough for this journey

If not, change plans and stay safe. It is okay to delay and ask people for help.





Getting started: From the office of the 'Lane Cove Tourist Park', this walk heads down the internal road, past the boom gates for about 50 m to turn left just past the laundry. The walk then continues along this road as it bends right after about 100 m , then leads down to a T-intersection. Just on the other side (and to the left) of this intersection, there is a set of steps beside the large 'Lane Cove National Park' sign. From this concreted section between sites 152 and 151, this walk follows the sign down the stone steps for about 60m, where the track then leads gently down to a T-intersection marked with a timber signpost (beside a large scribbly gum). From the intersection, the walk follows 'Lane Cove River Weir' sign south down the hill. The track leads gently down the side of the hill for about 80 m to pass a 'Native Flora' information sign, then about 90 m later passes a 'Bush Regeneration' information sign among the ferns. Just 30 m past this sign, the track leads over a small metal bridge beside the tall fern trees and 'Native Fauna' information sign. Here the track continues for a short distance to come to an intersection with Riverside Drive, where a 'Tourist Park' sign points back up the hill.


Lane Cove River tourist park (about 10 m back from the start).


This is a well-established caravan park on the edge of Lane Cove National Park, offering a variety of camp sites from tent to powered sites for caravans and even en suite cabins. The campsite is a great point to access many wonderful walks in Lane Cove Valley. There are many facilities including a laundry, toilets, showers (including facilities for people with disabilities and with infants), recreation room, Internet kiosk (with free access to Wildwalks.com), wireless Internet, BBQ's and a pool. There is bike hire available and the reception has basic supplies for sale (bread, milk, snacks, newspapers).
After another 25 m turn right, to head along Plassey Road.


After another 9 m head through/around the gate.


After another 190 m pass the toilet ( 10 m on your right).


Then head up the steps (about 9 m long)


After another 170 m find the "13 Cottonwood Glen" ( 5 m on your left).


Cottonwood Glen picnic area is a large open grassy spot on the bank of the Lane Cove River. There is a grove of trees along the edge of the river, but you can still get clear views across the water from the car park area. There are several picnic tables and a small toilet block just up the hill.
Then cross the bridge (about 5 m long)

After another 145 m pass the shelter ( 25 m on your left).

After another 150 m head through/around the gate.


After another 8 m pass the toilet ( 25 m on your left).

## Then head through/around the gate.

After another 320 m head up the 13
surface|wood steps (about 5 m long)
After another 55 m head down the 15 stone steps (about 6 m long)
After another 35 m come to the viewpoint.


After another 135 m continue straight, to head along Riverside Walk.

After another 370 m head up the 7 earthen steps (about 6 m long)

After another 9 m cross the bridge (about 4 m long)
After another 135 m head up the 11 earthen
steps (about 8 m long)
After another 215 m come to the viewpoint.

After another 270 m head up the 5 steps (about 5 m long)

After another 6 m (at the intersection of Riverside Drive \& Riverside Walk) turn right, to head along Riverside Drive (a vehicle track).

After another 15 m cross the Porters Creek Bridge (about 10 m long)
After another 9 m continue straight, to head along Riverside Drive.

After another 30 m pass the sign ( 6 m on your right).


After another 30 m continue straight, to head along Riverside Drive.

After another 90 m continue straight, to head along Riverside Drive.


After another 20 m pass the sign (on your right)


After another 9 m head up the earthen steps (about 25 m long)
Then cross the bridge (about 190 m long)


- After another 610 m (at the intersection of Riverside Drive \& Tunks Hill Road) continue straight, to head along Riverside Drive.

After another 50 m head down the 7 steps (about 3 m long)


After another 40 m pass the sign ( 9 m on your right).
After another 75 m continue straight, to head along The Great North Walk.


After another 95 m continue straight, to head along The Great North Walk.


After another 70 m pass the sign (on your left).

Then head down the 5 steps (about 2 m long)

After another 285 m cross the ford.

After another 165 m find the "Sandstone caves" ( 15 m on your right).


This fairly large sandstone overhang is found on the eastern side of the Lane Cove Valley. The walking track leads through the two caves that run in series, with the northern cave being larger. The lip of the overhang hangs down a bit, providing some extra protection from wind and rain. The cave also provide some shade and a cooler spot on hot days, and there are also a couple of well placed boulders forming nice seats.

After another 65 m cross the bridge (about 4 m long)
After another 450 m come to the viewpoint.

After another 630 m head down the 11 steps
(about 8 m long)
After another 8 m cross the bridge (about 15 m long)
After another 115 m cross the bridge (about 5 m long)

After another 45 m cross the bridge (about 7 m long)

Then cross the bridge (about 8 m long)

Then head up the 26 steps (about 20 m long)

After another 55 m head up the 7 stone steps (about 3 m long)
Then cross the bridge

After another 200 m cross the ford.


After another 130 m cross the bridge (about 5 m long)

Start of an alternate route: An alternative route linking Int. Great North Walk and Thistlethwaytes Picnic Area Trk to Int. Max Allen Dr and Jenkins Hill Trk.


To take the alternate route turn around here. Start heading along The Great North Walk.


After another 10 m continue straight, to head along The Great North Walk.

- After another 410 m (at the intersection of Lane Cove Depot Road \& The Great North Walk) veer left, to head along Lane Cove Depot Road (a service road).


After another 15 m (at the intersection of Lane Cove Depot Road \& The Great North Walk) continue straight, to head along The Great North Walk (a walking track).

- After another 120 m continue straight, to head along The Great North Walk.


After another 290 m (at the intersection of Max Allen Road \& The Great North Walk) turn sharp right, to head along Max Allen Road (a vehicle track).
After another $\overline{3} \overline{0}$ m pass the "Great North Walk" (on your left).


After another 85 m come to the end.


At the end of this alternate route, rejoin the main route.The álternate route finishes here. Turn sharp left to rejoin the main route at the 8.7 km waypoint.


After another 225 m come to the viewpoint ( 9 m on your right).

After another 70 m pass the toilet ( 25 m on your left).
After another 2 m continue straight, to head along Max Allen Road.
There is a shelter (about 5 m back from the start).

After another 80 m (at the intersection of Max Allen Road \& Lane Cove Depot Road) continue straight, to head along Max Allen Road.
After another 40 m find the "Schwartz Homestead" ( 20 m on your left).


The Schwartz Homestead is a neat little white and green 1920's timber cottage with a balcony on three sides. It was probably built by orchardist George Warr, who leased the land from 1917.
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After another 55 m pass the toilet ( 25 m on your left).

Start of an optional side trip: An optional side trip to Baker's Cottage.


Turn around and retrace your steps back the 65 $m$ to the main route.
Back at the main route turn right and follow on from the 8.4 km waypoint.

The alternate route finishes here. Turn sharp left to rejoin the main route at the 8.7 km waypoint.


After another 180 m pass the toilet ( 15 m on your left).


After another 255 m continue straight, to head along Max Allen Road.


After another 15 m continue straight, to head along Max Allen Road.

After another 30 m pass the toilet ( 25 m on your left). ค



After another 40 m cross the bridge (about 10 m long)
Then find the "Seat" ( 9 m on your right).


A stone seat, 42 cm high, 60 cm deep and 1.7 m wide with a 22 cm high arm and 22 cm backrest. After another 60 m find the "Lane Cove Weir" (on your right).


The Lane Cove River Weir was built in 1938 during the depression. The motivation for building the lake was to make the area more appealing for visitors' picnics. The weir created environmental issues such as silting and a decline in native fish populations. In more recent years, a 'fish ladder' has been constructed to allow fish to undertake their natural migration route for breeding. The weir proves an easy way for walkers to cross the Lane Cove River whilst enjoying the views up and downstream.


After another 10 m find the "Trip Hazard" ( 6 m on your left).


The edges of the weir are ungraded and there is a significant drop with water hazards. Keep clear of edges.


After another 3 m turn sharp right,

After another 10 m find the "Seat" ( 25 m on your left).


Two timber seats, 40 cm high, 38 cm deep and 1.8 m wide with a 35 cm backrest and no arm rests.
After another 70 m come to the viewpoint.


Two timber seats, 43 cm high, 48 cm deep and 1.8 m wide with no arm or backrest.

Then find the "Lane Cove River Lookout" (on your right).


Found along the timber boardwalk on the banks of the Lane Cove River, just up stream from the weir, is this lovely viewing platform. The boardwalk and platform are fenced ( 1.1 m high), there are two main seats and a stepped area for extra seating. The views extend upstream for about 250 m and is a great spot to watch water birds and the occasional paddle boat.
After another 150 m find the "Seat" ( 20 m on your left).


A timber slat picnic table under a tree. The table is 74 cm high, 92 cm deep and 2.1 m wide. The seats are 40 cm high, 30 cm deep and 2.1 m wide (no backrest).
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Then find the "BBQ" ( 20 m on your left).


An timber fired BBQ. Plate is 94 cm high, 46 cm wide and 42 cm deep.

After another 115 m find the "Potable Water" ( 20 m on your left).


A water tap on the grass, handle is 84 cm high.
After another 20 m find the "Illoura Picnic Area" ( 25 m on your left).


The Illoura Picnic Area in Lane Cove National Park, is an open grassy area beside the river and about 140 m downstream of the Boatshed. The picnic area has a water tap, picnic tables and wood fired BBQ. On the other side of the Riverside Drive is a small toilet block. The eastern edge of the picnic area is a large brick picnic shelter.
After another 65 m find the "Picnic Shelter" (15 $m$ on your left).


2 picnic tables in a large shelter. tables are 78 cm high, 93 cm deep and 2.1 m (the second table is 4.3 ) wide. The seats are 44 cm high, 29 cm deep and 2.1 m wide (second table seats are 3.7 m ).

Then find the "Illoura Picnic Shelter" (15 m on your left).


The park brick picnic shelter is on the bank of the Lane Cove River, near the Boatshed. There are two picnic tables in the shelter. The tables are 78 cm high, 93 cm deep and 2.1 m wide. The second table is 4.3 m wide. The seats are 44 cm high, 29 cm deep and 2.1 m wide. The second table has seats that are 3.7 m . Outside the shelter is another picnic table and wood BBQ. The picnic shelter is nestled in a grove of trees between the carpark and the open grassy Illoura picnic area. There is a small toilet block across the road
After another 10 m pass the shelter ( 8 m on your left).

After another 20 m come to the "Wheelchair Rough".


Two sections (of about 15 m each) of the track have exposed tree route, making the ground uneven and creating trip hazards.
After another 45 m find the "Pinch Point" (on your left).


Track narrow to a maximum width of 80 cm at this point.


The table is 73 cm high, 74 cm deep and 3 m wide. The seats are 41 cm high, 29 cm deep and 3 m wide (no backrest).


Lane Cove Boatshed, in Lane Cove National Park, is situated on the bank of the (you guessed it) Lane Cove River. You can hire rowboats, kayaks, pedal boats, bikes and canoes, for different ways to enjoy the river. The shop also sells ice-creams, chips and drinks. The shed is open on weekend from 10am-5pm. During summer school holidays, the shop is also open from 12-5pm. For more info, call Greg on 0418600695.

After another 25 m find the "Picnic Table" (on your left).


2 tables are 73 cm high, 90 cm deep and 2.1 m wide. The seats are 36 cm high, 31 cm deep and 2.1m wide (no backrest).

After another 195 m pass the BBQ ( 10 m on your left).

Then cross the bridge (about 2 m long)

After another 135 m head up the 12 metal steps (about 4 m long)
After another 180 m pass the toilet ( 35 m on your left).
After another 85 m head through the bollard.


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After another 60 m continue straight.


After another 40 m pass the toilet ( 15 m on your left).

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After another 45 m find the " 9 Carters Creek" (9 $m$ on your right).


Carters Creek Picnic Area is the ninth formal picnic space along this stretch of the Lane Cove River. This picnic area is home to a couple of sheltered picnic tables, a gas BBQ a large open grassy area, garbage bins, toilets and a car park. There is some limited access to the river view. A pleasant spot among the tall gums.


After another 225 m head through/around the gate.

Continue straight, to head along Riverside Drive.

After another 15 m continue straight.


After another 55 m veer left.

Then head down the steps (about 9 m long)


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After another 250 m continue straight.


After another 300 m continue straight.
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After another 20 m pass the "Macquarie Park Cemetery" ( 20 m on your right).
