



Easy track



This walk guides you along raised boardwalk through rare and engaged banksia ecosystem. An opportunity to appreciate a sensitive environment close up and in an environmentally sensitive way. The information sign at the start of the walk provides insight into the Banksia scrub and its value. This walk is recommended if you would like to look at a type of vegetation that once covered a much larger area of Sydney. This walk is mostly downhill from Jennifer St. If the return trip is too much you can organise for someone to pick you up from Cape Banks Rd. Let us begin by acknowledging the Gadigal & Bidjigal people, Traditional Custodians of the land on which we travel today, and pay our respects to their Elders past and present.



Class 2 of 6 Clear and well formed track or trail	
<b>Quality of track</b>	Smooth and hardened path (1/6)
<b>Gradient</b>	Gentle hills with occasional steps (2/6)
<b>Signage</b>	Clearly signposted (1/6)
<b>Infrastructure</b>	Generally useful facilities (such as fenced cliffs and seats) (1/6)
<b>Experience Required</b>	No experience required (1/6)
<b>Weather</b>	Weather generally has little impact on safety (1/6)



### Naturally Accessible

**Slope summary:** No steps, mostly gentle downhill run with a steeper 15m section about 1.5:12 steep, then return back up.

**Surface summary:** 1.4m wide timber boardwalk with a short section of concrete path at the top and lower end. The lower end has a gap of 84cm to access road (or turn around and go back up).

**Getting to the start:** From Anzac Parade

- Turn on to Anzac Parade then drive for 105 m
- At roundabout, take exit 2 onto Anzac Parade and drive for another 295 m
- Turn left onto Jennifer Street and drive for another 470 m


### Before you start any journey ensure you;


**Getting started:** From the end of Jennifer St (near Marconi Pl), Little Bay, this walk follows the concrete footpath between the timber bollards (1.7m gap), past the 'Botany Bay National Park - Jennifer Street Lands' sign. After about 25m, the walk passes the large sheltered 'Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub' sign shelter to find a timber seat. The timber boardwalk leads gently downhill through the dense heath for about 160m to pass the fenced 'revegetation area'. The boardwalk continues to lead through the forest with the occasional water glimpses for another 80m where the path starts to lead moderately steeply downhill for about 15m before starting to mostly level out again. At the end of the timber boardwalk, the walk follows the concrete path to find another timber seat. From here the walk continues along the footpath for 35m to pass the 'Jennifer Street Boardwalk' sign, head through the narrow timber bollards and come to Cape Banks Rd, La Perouse next to the golf course.



Jennifer Boardwalk provides you with an elevated view through a rare and endangered ecological community known as the Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub. This community of native plants is protected under the Threatened Species Conservation Act. These Banksia once occupied around 5,300 hectares of land between North Head and Botany Bay in Sydney's eastern suburbs. Currently, surviving stands totalling approximately 146 hectares have been recorded by the local government areas of Botany, Randwick, Waverley, and Manly .



A timber slat bench seat, 42cm high, 31cm deep and 2.1m wide with a 38cm high backrest.



An approximalty 15m section of the boardwalk is 1.5:12 steep.



A timber slat bench seat, 45cm high, 32cm deep and 2.1m wide with a 38cm high backrest.



Timber bollard pinchpoints around edge of carpark. The gap between the bollard are 84cm they are 85cm high.
